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

You may already have done so but just to check again.

DID YOU: Drain all the water from the engine

Check that drain holes are clear & open.

Remove the gas cylinder

Remove the battery

Remove bedding, cushions, curtains etc.

Remove perishable goods, food etc.

Clean out the fridge & food lockers

Arrange ventilation throughout

Arrange adequate props under boat/trailer.

Arrange anti-chafe protection for mooring lines if wintering afloat.

Check the terms of your insurance policy.

A good fitted cover saves woodwork etc from the ravages of wind, rain and frost, but care should be taken to ensure ventilation under the cover.

Now is the time to arrange repairs, engine overhauls etc, to avoid unnecessary delays at the start of next season.

1 Lough Rec Development:

Development Organisation the following resolution proposed by Councillor J.T.-Kirwan, Roscommon Co. Co and seconded by Councillor P.J. Coghill, Westmeath Co., Co., was adopted;

- a) that integrated programme be prepared urgently for access to and developemnt of Lough Ree as in the case of the Sliavo Bloom Mountains, depecially as extra funds may be available for roads.
- b) that special meeting be held to consider progress with Development of Lough Ree as compared to the Development of Lough Derg and also progress with Brady Shipman Martin Report to be addressed by such bodies as Bord Failte, Lakeland Tourism Ltd., O.P.W. the County Councils, Fishery Boards etc.,
- (c) That sub-committee of the board be formed to visit all access points on Lough-Ree and all access points on Lough Durg and to report back to the Board.
- d) that joint meeting of all public rupresuntatives in the electoral areas adjoining Lough Ree be held to consider access to and development of Lough Ree.

Councillor Kirwan , in support of his motion presented a comprehensive report of the extensive developments carried out on Lough Derg, with quays and jetties , slipways, major berthing, public lighting , telephones, parking , toilets, seating, grassed areas, landscaping , childrens playgrounds, swimming facilities, refuse bins, standard Lough Derg location maps, road access and signposting and lakeside drivers , He compared this with the marked absence of such development on Lough Rea and he listed many areas around Lough Rea where where such developments could and should be provided. He also made comparisons with access and development on Lough Corrib, Lough Mask , Blessington , Lough Erne, Lough Neagh and Strangford Lough.

"Is it not a pity that the Midlands which is farthest from the see has the least access to the greatest stretch of water it has" said Councillor Kirwan in his address to the MRDO Board.

Let us hope that Councillor Kirwan will roceive the full support of his colleagues on the Board of the Midland Regional Davelopment Organisation , of the public representatives in the electoral areas adjoining Lough Ree, of Board Failte, of Lakelands Tourism Ltd., of the O.P.W., and of the many other Associated bodies including the full support of the members of the I.W.A.I. for the speedy implementation of this long overdue project.

DOYLE's DELIGHTS Hedgehog Meat Balls

1½ lbs minced beef

4 ozs long grain rice

1 onion finely chopped

1 can condensed tomato soup or pkt. tomato soup with recommended amount of water.

½ pt of water

pepper and salt

Parsley and mixed herbs, optional

Mix meat, rice, onion, pepper and salt, and herbs if used.

Form into small balls, pressing well together. Approx 16 balls

Heat soup and water in pressure cooker, when boiling drop meat balls into hot mixture.

Put on lid and bring to pressure, cook for 45 mins approx., allow to cool slowly.

When you take off the lid you should find that the rice is sticking out of the meat balls like the spikes on a haddehog!!

Pineapple Souffle

1 Pineapple jelly

1 medium size time pineapple

1 large tin condensed milk

Put jelly and juice in saucepan plus enough sater to make one third of a pint, heat to melt jelly.

Cut up threequarters of pineapple into small pieces, keeping the rest to decorate the top of the finished souffle.

Beat the milk until it thickens, beat in the melted jelly and stir in the cut up pineapple. Pour into a large dish and allow to set. (approx 1 hr) Decorate the top with remaining pineapple, cherries and cream.

Chocolate Sauce

6 ozs brown sugar

2 ozs cocoa

} pt milk

few drops vanilla essence

Put all ingredients into a saucepan and mix well.

Cook over a low heat until smooth, bring to boil, boil for 2 mins stirring all the time.

This sauce is delicious with steamed puddings or with ice-cream. It may be used hot or cold.

Car Treasure Hunt and Social
Saturday afternoon and evening, 20th April, Shannon Harbour
Rally Committee in association with The Royal Canal Amenity Group,

This is the bill that when enacted will transfer "the whole of the Canal undertaking" to the Commissioners of Public Works. The executive committee of the I.W.A.I. met in Dublin during last week and decided to ask for an immediate meeting with the Minister for Communications and to seek clarification on some aspects of the Bill that are causing worry!

The bill, which runs to seventeen pages, contains many detailed provisions, but the overall trust of the bill is:-

- 1. Repeal all, or virtually all, existing legislation that appertains to canals, their management and functioning.
- 2. Hand over the canals to the O.P.W.
- 3. Give wide ranging powers to the O.P.W

Number 3 above is what causes the most worry. A few quotes from the bill will illustrate how well founded those worries are:

Section 2, sub-sect. 8.

"Nothing in this section should cause the commissioners to be regarded as a canal undertaker or a canal company for the purpose of this or any other enactment", question that comes to mind is, what should we regard the Commissioners as?

Section 7, - 1

"On and after the vesting day the Commissioners may make byelaws in relation to -

- (a) The regulations of the conditions (including conditions as to safety) under which boats may be used on the canals.
 - (b) The closing to navigation of any part of the canals.
 - (c) The alteration of water levels of the canal
- (d) The charging and fixing of fees, tolls and charges in respect of the use by boats of the canals
 This section would effectively do away with the current provisions whereby traffic must cease for at least three years prior to a closing order, other than when such an order is brought before the Dail is passed.

There are many other aspects to the bill but the idea of handing over the canals to the O.P.W with a carte blanche to write whatever bye-laws they wish (shades of registrations?) and to administer said bye-laws with as heavy or light a hand as the O.P.W. feel is appropriate, is asking a lot - particularly when one bears in mindthe autocratic management over the past few years.

The provision and protection of water rights and feeders also seem to be in some doubt.

All in all a worrying situation - we may yet have to man the battlements - but lets hope sense and reason will prevail.

Portrunny Developement

Terry Leyden, T.D. and Councillor Jack Kirwan met members of Athlone Branch I.W.A.I. and gave their full support to the proposed development for Portrunny. The I.W.A.I. proposal involves the building of a deep water jetty outside the existing jetty and to extend the breakwater to afford protection from S.E. winds. Also included in the proposal is a plan to culvert the existing jetty, thereby facilitating the "flushing" of the existing harbour.

The deep water jetty will have berths for at least ten cruisers and will be usable throughout the entire boating season.

Mr Leyden felt that with proper planning and a little effort Portrunny had the potential to be to Athlone and Roscommon what Salthill is to Galway and the West.

Councillor Kirwan agreed that the I.W.A.I. proposal complimented his recent submission to the Midland Regional Development Organisation regarding development on Lough Ree.

The I.W.A.I. are confident that the efforts of Councillors Leydon and Kirwan will be successful in securing the finance necessary for completion of the Portrunny development.

Roscommon Co.Co.

Representatives from An Taisce and Athlone Branch I.W.A.I. met Roscommon County Council recently to discuss various aspects of planing, development, concervation, pollution and communication between the County Council and An Taisce regarding such matters. Aspects of the Brady Shipman and Martin report relating to Lough Ree and Lough Key were discussed, together with proposals for development at Hodson Bay, Lecarrow, Portrunny and Galey Bay, and conservation at St. Johns Wood. This initial meeting dealt only with the general attitudes of both parties on the various items under discussion, but the County Council have promised to meet smaller local groups on localised issues.

Wildfowl Census

A recent wild fowl count organised by the National Association of Regional Game councils revealed a drastic reduction in the number of mallard and geese. There is, however, in the Athlone Area an increase in widgen and teal.

This situation gives rise to anxiety when one considers that mallard are the main species being hatched and reared through wild

mallards ability to breed and survive in the wild. The question of changing the shooting season from september to October would seem worthwhile when the flight of the bird would be stronger.

A Sword from Cu Chulainns time

Yes, a fanciful suggestion about a sword found by Derry McMahon, a member of Athlone Sub Agua Club in May 1984, is not as far-fetched as it might seem. The iron sword was a chance find from the gravelly bed of the Shannon where it constricts from Lough Ree on the approach to Athlone, and is tentatively dated to the Pagan Celtic Iron Age in Ireland which can be taken as the first few centuries before and after the time of Christ. It is a very welcome addition to the twenty two swords broadly related to this type found in Ireland so far.

The sword measures 23 inches long and its effectiveness in the dexterous hand was as lethal as the heavier weapons that came into fasion with the Viking incursions towards the first millenium A.D. and subsequent Norman styles that needed a strong hand and wrist. Bronze Age techniques of fashioning weapons from casting bronze in stone and clay moulds were changing to adapt to the new process of iron working and the Athlone sword is a product of this new age.

Derry McMahon has deposited the Sword in the National Museum, where it will receive the necessary conservation treatment and also the all important continuity of custedianship so vital for its future safety and study. Go along and have a look next time you are near the National Museum in Dublin.

ATHLONE TO MOUNT SHANNON by Aoife Hanley.

Lough Ree was certainly looking its best that bright August morning. The distinctive shape of the scots-pine on Inismore, the bright yellow shores, the fresh green woodland and the comforting hum of motor-boats gave an air of excitement to that young day.

To me it was a voyage into the unknown, to others a 30 mile stretch of the river Shannon already known like the back of their hand.

I believe we defied the laws of gravity for once in history as we surveyed the luggage piled sky-high in the dinghy with satisfaction.

Mammy assured us that everything was organised, but I had my doubts about that!

The Hispaniola (our Jag 25) our future home for two watery weeks was gaily bobbing on her anchorage.

You can imagine the confusion that followed After

We said good-bye to Athlone and the smokey dump which is now forgotten. My memories of the days that followed are full of the scolding of coots on a quiet evening at dusk, the lap of water and the unintelligible foreign languages of tourists locking in.

Travelling along the Shannon is pleasant and dreamy, not too energetic and never boring. Shannon air and food go very well together and our

appitites were never satisfied. And so two pleasant days throbbed by.

Then out of the summer haze loomed Portumna bridge. Over dinner we decided to get the worrying job of raising the mast over with. That evening we raised the mast and rolled into our cosy bunks to wait for the opening of the bridge on the morrow.

The mainsail was unfurled, clicked into position and hauled up the halyards. The J.1344 stood out boldly on the spotlessly white background. We then released the sheets and hoisted the Genoa up. It opened like a swan's wings, majestic and dazzling in the sunlight as it towered above us. It belly filled with morning wind and it funneled it back to the mainsail. They strained and tugged the tortured sheets eager to be gone and away. There was a flap of excited canvas as Anna cast us off.

By now we were beginning to tire of the river and longed for more adventure and we heaved a sigh of relief as the last red and black navigation posts ushered us into Lough Derg.

It lay before us, vast, grey and tossing in the warm west wind. trees on the far shore looked tiny and inconspicous amid the tossing waves. The sky overhead was a pale watery grey melting into Lough Derg at the

The bow sliced through the froth and foam, troughs and waves of Lough Derg in the midst of that vast grey circle, leaving a trail of bubbles behind The wind was cool and refreshing and twirled the telltales in a careless

I helmed an estimated 17 miles to Mountshannon and enjoyed every wave of it! Passing Garrykennedy the wind dwindled to a mere whisper and the lap a lap - glug glug could be audible again.

The sheets stapped straining and the tense muscles of the mainsail relaxed after the ordeal.

The glassy lake rippled silver and reflected a mediterranean blue sky and the lush vivid greens of Lough Derg.

Somebody else relieved me of the helm as I went to the bow and looked down into the cool crystel water bubbeling by. I got myself into an upside down position with Lough Derg above my head.

My reflection below writhed in snakelike movements. An island lay green in the distance, Inis Cealtra. Behind that lay Mountshannon.

We'd arrived!

MARINE RADIO

The stand of the Dept. of Communications at the Boat Show provided a lot of interesting information about the Irish Maritime Radio Service. The Coast Station network on V.H.F. is now working and is in the process of expansion. Already established are Valentia and Malin Head. Valentia works on CH.16 and has two slave (automatic) stations at Knockgour CH. 23 and Kilkeaveragh CH.24; while Malin Head CH.16 has a sub-station at Crockalough CH.23. Calls should be made to the slave stations rather than the main station. These coast stations will provide all the usual services such as link calls into the telephone system, telegrams, weather forecasts, traffic lists and medical advice. Naturally to avail of link calls or telegrams, radio installations must be licenced and be able to quote their AAIC (Accounting Authority Indicator Code).

of more immediate interest to boats on the inland waterways is the fact that within a month or two another coast station will be working at Rosslare, and in another year or so more will be established. For instance already a coast-watch (safety only) is already working on CH.16 based in Dublin Airport.

These developments mean that boats on our inland waterways must exercise greater care and discipline when using V.H.F. radio. These coast stations are situated and equipped to transmit and receive over quite large distances and in certain atmospheric conditions V.H.F. traffic on our waterways could be quite easily picked up on the coast. Incorrect usage of channels or incorrect procedures could interfere seriously with the use of V.H.F. radio for Safety at Sea.

The consequences of this welcome expansion of our coastal services are serious as far as inland waterways are concerned. Correct procedures (i.e. phrases and words) must be used and correct channels must be used. It is not good practise to pick a channel (a term one hears frequently on the air) - there are certain channels for certain purposes and a radio operator should know these. The logical conclusion is that all radio installations and operators on the inland waterways must be licenced. Too many boat owners think is is not necessary or else that 'they know it all'. The formalities are quite simple and the rules are easily learned. For further information write to Dept. of Communications, Marine Radio Division, Setanta Centre, Sth. Frederick St., Dublin 2. Let's get our act together before its done for us.

"The insurance is fixed up" and rally organisers all over the country can breath a sigh of relief. I expect you have all

increase in premium being asked for renewal of our Marine Insurance Policy.

At first the premium was being increased from £400 to £12,000. This figure was then reduced to £9,000, which was still unrealistic as far as our financial resources were concerned. Other Insurance companies both in Ireland and England were asked for quotations to no avail.

Peter Hanna was then invited to go on the radio programme on RTE Radio on Saturday Morning 11th May. Peter obviously got the message across loud and clear because on Monday 13th May the Association got an invitation to a meeting from the Insurance Company to tal; about a new offer.

The new offer was a renewal premium of £800 for this year with a review in October. This was accepted by the Association.

The probability of further increases next year is very real, but for now our insurance problems are sorted out and rallies etc. can go ahead as planned. Well done all concerned.

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Junes Chicken Casserole

When June invited us to dinner one evening she served this chicken dish which we thought was very good. She kindly gave me the recipe and I am glad to be able to share it with you.

6 chicken breasts (skinned) Chicken pieces are just as good l tsp black pepper

2 tsp paprika

3 oz butter

4 oz mushrooms (sliced)

20 oz can condensed celery soup

4 oz Gruyere cheese (grated) Cheddar will substitute if unable to obtain Gruyere. Bread crumbs, optional

Rub Chicken all over with pepper and paprika, (I find there is enough salt in the soup so if you use salt go easy!) In a casserole dish melt butter and fry mushrooms and chicken. Stir in soup and add a little milk if you think it is not liquid enough. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for about $\frac{1}{2}$ an hour, i.e. to cook the chicken. Or, cover and place in a slow oven and cook for about 1 hour. When chicken is cooked cover with grated cheese and bread crumbs and brown under the grill.


