You Really Must GO

To the Boat Club's Annual Dinner Dance on New Years Eve in the Shamrock Lodge Hotel. A memorable night is guaranteed. Music by the New Avengers. Some tickets are still available from committee members, £14.00 each, dress informal.

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GLUHWEIN How about a mulled wine (Gluhwein our German friends call it) for Christmas cheer. If you can spare some of your own elderberry wine for this all the better. To serve 6 not very thirsty friends you will need:-

- 1 inexpensive bottle of red wine
- ½ pint cold water
- 3 cloves
- 1 level teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1 inch stick cinnamon or equivalent in ground cinnamon
- 6 ozs granulated sugar

The rind and juice of 1 lemon

Peel the rind from the lemon using a potato peeler and put it into a pan with the water, lemon juice, cloves, nutmeg, cinnamon and sugar. Bring the liquid slowly to the boil and simmer it for 15 minutes.

Strain the liquid and return it to the pan. Add the red wine and heat it

but do not allow the drink to boil. Serve in heat proof glasses. I usually add a little brandy to liquid before pouring it into the glasses.

Branch Meeting Report

Changing the monthly meeting from Friday to Monday night seems to have worked, as there was a large turnout for the January meeting.

Items discussed were:-

A sub-committee has been set up to examine the feasibility of setting up an Inland Waterways/Maritime museum in the Docks area of Athlone. The committee are to prepare a report on how the museum could be set up, funded, run and maintained, and the range and type of articles which would be displayed. If you have any items of interest please contect Sean Fitzsimons, Seans Bar Athlone (0902 2358)

The ESB are currently constructing 3 overhead power lines, each 38KVolt, which will cross the river just north of the proposed new bridge on the new by-pass road at Athlone. This was the subject of some angry debate regarding the legality of constructing these power lines without prior notice or permission, particurlarly in view of recent discussion and correspondence between the IWAI Council and ESB Headquarters on the whole aspect of power lines crossing navigable waterways.

The power line crossing the harbour entrance at Lamesborough is still causing concern for the safety of boat users, and so far efforts to have this line re-routed have failed.

Purther representations are to be made to the ESB on both of these problems.

The Portrunny project sub-committee are to meet with local politicians in an effort to have funds set aside in the Roscommon Co Co estimates, so that

Ballykeeran we have been asked by the owner of the property to remove the jetty. The branch are to look for an alternative site in the same general area.

It was with dismay that we read in the Leitrim Observer, a report in the farming section on the Shannon drainage which suggested that since heavy barge traffic has ceased, the water levels could be lowered between Athlone and Meelick. So they think we have wheels under our boats? The article went on to report of a meeting regarding Shannon drainage at the Department of Agriculture which was representative of Farmers, ESB, OPW and IBRA (What? no IWAI)

It was however reassuring to hear Joe Rea suggesting that dredging the channel would allow a better flow of water and hence help to minimise the flooding. Lets hope commensense prevails.

It gives us great pleasure to announce that the Athlone Branch nominee for the Donal O'Leary Memorial Trophy is our own Aerial Editor - Declan Walsh, for his continued service to the Aerial and the branch over many, many years. Need we say more?

In a general discussion on the role of the Association, the agarent apathy among the membership, and the poor influx of younger members, the feeling emerged that the LWAI tends to do its business in a low profile, formal manner and this proceedure does not attract media attention and hence, public awareness. There are enough issues, such as the ESB Power Lines, Pollution, Development etc., which have far reaching consequences and deserve greater media attention. So maybe its time we changed our tack and went "public", so watch this space.

4 Eggs, seperated

4 ozs. costor sugar

1 pt cream

vailla essence, optional

Whick egg whites until stiff, using a bowl big enough to hold rest of ingredients when added. Then whick in sugar a spoon at a time, the whites will get stiffer as sugar is added.

Whisk cream until it forms soft peaks, and add to whites.

Whisk egg yolks until creamy and add to cream and whites. Turn into a container (approx 1.4 litre) and freeze.

Leave to thaw at room temperature for 5 mins, and serve.

In despair he decided to emigrate. At that time in Athlone there was a publican who had a flat in Spain.


The rest of the story is history.

Are You a Sensible Person

Any sensible person who takes up boating recognises that it is a pastime that has dangers and tries to prepare himself against them.

It is possible to protect oneself to a large extent by some simple rules and practices. The lirst rule for anyone should be Dont Fall Overboard.

If somebody does call overboard it can be difficult to get back on board again especially if they are wearing heavy waterlogged clothing.

It is up to the skipper to decide which method of rescue works best on his or her boat. Having worked out what seems a good technique the crew should be given practice in it. However it seems that practicing man overboard drill is something that most of us are going to do when we get time. We are likely to be still waiting to get around to it when we have to do it in earnest. One thing a good skipper might do is to go overboard, wearing full clothing, and see for themself's the problems of reboarding. Although not the same as going overboard while the boat is under way it does give good practice in the actual process.

No Cook Chutney

- 8 ozs stoneless dates
- 8 ozs sultanas
- 8 ozs onions
- 8 ozs apples, weighed after peeling and coring
- 8 ozs soft brown sugar
- 1 pt malt vinegar
- 1 level teaspoon salt

Black pepper

Cayenne pepper

- 1 level teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 Level teaspoon pickling spice.

Mince the dates, sultanas, onions and apples into a large bowl, stir in sugar and vinegar and mix well. Add salt, black pepper, cayanne and ground ginger. Put pickling spice in a small muslin bag and add. Cover and leave in a cool place for 24 hrs, stirring occasionally. Remove bag from chutney and put into clean, dry jars and cover with vinegar-proof lids to seal.

This chutney may be eaten at once or will keep well for six months if stored in a cool dry place. If you think it is too sweet leave out some of the sugar. The main thing is, that as it is uncooked, your house will not smell of chutney for weeks after you make it.

When I gave you 'June's Chicken' I forgot to memtion that slices of lean pork, instead of chicken in this dish are very good. One of my friends suggested that it sho uld be a mixture of pork and chicken, perhaps he is right.

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Shannon Flooding

Mr James Crehan, of the Athlone Regional I.F.A., select committee dealing with the Shannon Drainage, by invitation, addressed the Athlone Branch march meeting on the problems of the Shannon Flooding and on the IFA's proposed solutions to the problem. The IFA want (i) the removal of silt banks and debris in the Meelick area, (ii) the excavation of the channel in the Shannonbridge area (iii) six extra sluices at Meelick (iv) a general improvement of the channel from Athlone to Meelick to allow a greater volume of water to flow. These proposals are mainly based on the 1961 joint OPW/ESB report on the first stage of investigation as recommended in the Rydell report (1954)

They are also proposing to have the water level between Athlone and Meelick lowered by 18" from October to March to help reduce the flood effects. The branch views were made known to Mr Crehan on the above points, particularly in relation to the lowering of water levels. A subcommittee has been set up to examine the information available regarding water levels etc., and to produce a report on the flooding problem.

Museum

The Museum subcommittee presented their interim report which recommended the setting up of a waterways Museum in the Presbyterian Church on the docks at Athlone. The report dealt with the museum in the context of an overall Quayside and Castle Development.

The accomplishment of the museum would be dependent on the co-operation of Athlone UDC, and ANCO for the building, while the wider Quayside Development would require the co-operation of Athlone UDC, ANCO OPW and ESB.

Royal Tour

A small group from Athlone branch joined with the Royal Canal Amenity Group tour of the restoration work done on the Royal Canal which was held on 16th March. The tour visited Maynooth, Kilcock, Enfield, Thomastown, Mullingar and finished the evening with a meal and some very live entertainment in the Rustic Inn at Abbeyshrule. The R.C.A.G. are to be congratulated for the quantity and the quality of the restoration work to date, and they deserve our wholehearted support. Interest in the Royal Canal appears to have weakened a little in this area, perhaps it is time to get a good restoration project under way at this end of the canal to revive interest, and extend the restoration.

ESB Wires

Communication with the ESB regarding overhead power line clearance over navigations is now reaching a fairly critical stage and are in the hands of our legal advisers. We will keep you informed as things develop.

Film Show

With great pleasure we bring you a days extract from this delightful narrative of exploratory cruising.

Log of Crannagh 6th August 1985 - 12th August 1985 (recovery week)

Wednesday 7th August - Up the Suck
Morning grey and windy so we rise late. Hang out some washing - double
pegged for safety. While Skipper gives Dog a good run I prepare a picnic
lunch. Dog very disconsolate at being told to mind the boat. She knows
that means we're going somewhere lovely that she can't come.

Armed with the ½" Ordinance Survey map we set off in the dinghy to explore.
By using the road map we are following in very prestigeous footsteps, as
Mr. McBride told us at the Rally dinner that he and Harry Rice did just that
in the days of pioneering the Shannon. The water level being quite high
we did't find the underwater weir that Ruth Heard had told us about.

As we travel upriver I notice, on the starboard bank, beautiful wooden stiles at fences and wooden bridges with handrails at ditches. One could walk a good two miles of river bank. To facilitate those with fishing licences?

Log continued.....

We pull in to the shelter of some overhanding trees for lunch. Beer, turkey pate sandwiches, salad sandwiches, cheese and tomatoes followed by fruit. Refuel the outboard and away we go again only to find just around the next corner is a confluence of waters. Very strong currents. The waterway narrows and we think that we've reached the ford which ends the navigation. We turn for home and make the journey back in two-thirds of the time it took us to go up. Back at Crannagh we get a rapturous welcome from Dog.

Before leaving our mooring I gather some leaves and berries from a tree which I can't identify.

All ready to leave, me on bow in the middle of trees. Because of nearly being swept off by these I fail to obey orders to push off. So, the engine has to do this and the dinghy gets caught in low branches and breaks the painter with the thrust. As I regain my equilibrium I see the loose dinghy and manage to grab it with the boat Hook. The breeze is feroclous so skipper has to get the boat lined up, put me on wheel while he goes back into dingny and ties tempory knot in painter. - Very glad he took his scouting seriously!

Clear run down to Shannon Harbour turn but skipper turns other way! We moor for the night very cosy in Ballinasb.e canal mouth.

Just settled in and having a relaxing tipple with who should we see turning into Shannon Harbour but "Orla Eile". A blast from our horn and Peadar turns smartly and comes to join us. Sometime later saw Lung come from Banagher and turn into Shannon Harbour. Did not blow our horn. No room; No pub! Shortly afterwards Peadar left to have a look at Shannon Harbour for the first time.

The Skipper succumbs to his passion for canals and goes to examine the remains of the 37th lock and I take to the galley. While scrubbing potatoes I can't help thinking of a story told to me by one of the Shannon Saviours. It seems that when C.I.E. talked of handing the Ballinasloe Canal over to Bord-na-Mona they (the Saviours) readied two boats to do the journey to Ballinasloe - which by law would have saved it for another three years. By then the climate for closures might have changed. For some reason they were talked out of it at the last minute. What a shame. In really bad weather, as now, it would be a lovely change.

Skipper back. Says you'd hardly know that there was a canal above the lock! Experimental supper of steak, coated with mixture of French mustard tomato puree, sugar and herbs, with sliced onion in the middle all wrapped in foil and roasted. Served with parsnip and baked potatoes. Very peaceful night.

Quayside Development/Museum Project

Athlone Urban District Council received a deputation from Athlone Branch I.W.A.I., on Monday 7th April to discuss the proposed Quayside Development/Museum project. The deputation of Damien Delaney, Jean Hollinshead and Paul Doran told Athlone U.D.C. that the tourists first view of Athlone was that of the town dump on one side and a derelict quayside on the other side which did little to invite the tourist to stop over and spend some time in the town. The castle, which had enormous potential as a focal point, and tourist attraction was also showing signs of decay and we felt that now was the time to give the castle and the quayside a facelift.

Our proposal could be divided into three elements:-

- 1) A complete facelift of the Castle to include cleaning of the stonework etc., and to provide floodlighting.
- 2) A clean up of the quayside with the provision of additional trees, seating and lighting. The removal of the OPW crane base and shed, ESB & Telecom Eireann poles and cables. Encouragement to property owners in the area to facelift and develop their premises to compliment the area.
- 3) For Athlone UDC to acquire and preserve the Presbyterian Church so that an Inland Waterways Museum could be established in the area.

Mr Jack Taffe, County Manager told the deputation that if the IWAI were to go ahead and undertake the seating and tree planting and general clean up it would go a long way towards creating a favourable climate for the enterprise. He said that the IWAI as a voluntary organisation should have an easier job raising funds than would a statutery body such as the Council. He assured the deputation that no move would be made to demolish the Presbyterian Church without a prior decision of the UDC. Our thanks to the chairman and members of Athlone UDC for the enthusiastic and courteous manner with which they received our deputation.

Shannon Flooding

The Shannon Flooding sub-committee reported to the April meeting on the items raised by Mr Crehan of the IFA. The sub-committee are gathering

isolated sections would give very little flooding relief, that the complete section from Athlone to Meelick would have to be dredged to give any improvement to the situation, but the effects that this would have on the rate of flow of the river and on the ecology of the whole area would have to be studied carefully before such a project was undertaken. The branch decided to oppose any moves to lower the water levels as this could interfere with navigation.

ESB Wires

The saga of low ESB power lines goes on with little progress, in fact in their most recent correspondence the ESB advise us that prudence would dictate that the height of boats sailed on the river should be based on the minimum clearance of 10.6 metres above normal summer water level. If prudence took a walk around Lough Ree and Lough Derg she could count at least 100 sailing boats with masts well in excess of this height. But we struggle on regardless!

Our grand new rubbish bin containers have been installed at Hodson Bay and Lecarrow. Alas some terribly wicked impetuous thespian (TWIT for short) decided to burn his rubbish inside the container at Lecarrow and destroyed our grand paintwork. WOK WORK - Stir fry beef with tomatoes

If you have not got a wok this stir fry beef can be made just as well in a large frying pan. Everything you cook by this method must be cut up very small as otherwise it will not be cooked.

1 1b beef, round or rib steak

2 tablespoons soy sauce

2½ teaspoons cornflour

2 teaspoons brown sugar or honey

4 tomatoes, halved and quartered

I onion finely sliced

2 oz mushrooms

mixed herbs, optional pepper and salt

5 tablespoons oil, approx.

Combine finely sliced beef (pieces about 1 inch long and thin) with soy sauce, cornflour, sugar and I tablespoon oil add salt and mixed herbs and set aside.

Heat 1 tablespoon oil in wok and stir fry onions, tomatoes and mushrooms for 1 or 2 minutes, set aside.

Heat 2 tablespoons oil in wok and add beef slices. Stir fry quickly for 5 or 6 minutes

Add vegatables and stir until hot. Serve immediately with rice or potatoes.

Some finely chopped carrots and/or a few peas make this dish look a bit more colourful.



Rubbish

The May meeting concerned itself with rubbish,— or rather the disposal and collection of refuse. There were complaints about the infrequent collection system around the docks area at Athlone, at Hodson Bay, Lecarrow and Portrunny. With so much unemployment in the area it seems odd that a few extra people could not be gainfully employed in the refuse collection system to "keep Ireland tidy".

We too play our part by being a bit more careful about the way we prepare and dispose of our refuse. Our efforts will be directed towards getting more frequent collections particularly during the boating season.

Museum

A survey of the Presbyterian Church has been undertaken. A complete new roof and floor will be required and costings for this work are being prepared.

A sub-committee meanwhile are pressing ahead with the quay wall seating and tree development, and costings etc., are being prepared before final proposals are presented to Athlone UDC.

Flooding

The flooding sub-committee continue to entarge their information file with an excellent report from John Weaving on the problems and possible solutions in the Meelick, Banagher, Shannonbridge, Clonmacnoise and Wren Island areas.

In his report John points out that flooding is due to natural restrictions in the river which if removed would cure most of the rlooding problems. The three main areas are one mile and two miles upstream of Meelick Weir and immediately upstream of Banagher.

There are 8 locations listed at which if restrictions were removed would reduce the flooding. However John warns that "without annual flooding the fertility of the callow lands will be reduced. The annual top dressing of nutrients particularly those originating in Athlone will be missed".

Shannon | Louding

With the heavy rainfall this summer it seems inevitable that the will be major flooding problems again this coming winter. We have included a report from John Weaving, on the problems and possible solutions to what has become a major source of frustration to farmers and boating people.

Report to I.W.A.I. Athlone Branch from Mr. John Weaving regarding River Shannon Flooding. April 1986.

It is usual to blame the navigation weirs and the operation of the sluices for any flooding on the Shannon. However anyone who has travelled upstream in a laden boat or with a heavy tow in flood conditions will realise that flooding is due to natural restrictions in the river, and that the weirs, sited on wide stretches of the river can handle any volumn of water which reaches them.

In times of flodd the river level does not rise in an even gradient between weirs, but rises in a series of steps each showing a natural restriction of the river. On the section between Athlone and Meelick there are three main restrictions which if removed would almost cure all problems. All data relates to flood conditions.

- 1. A small island 1 mile upstream of Meelick Weir. This restricts the flow to a very narrow and shallow channel, on the Galway side. The wider channel east of the island is blocked by silt and reeds.

 Below this point there is no flooding, the river being contained between its banks. Immediately upstream the river is at Bank level, the side drains b.acked up, and the low parts of the fields flooded. Obstruction approximately 100 yards in lenght; Rise in river over this distance 2°; rate of flow 4 knots. (3 times that in the river below this point.).
- 2. Shannon Grove 2 miles upstream of Meelick. Known to canal hands as Wallers Ford. Area of shoals and shallows, blocked by two small islands. Exit from back river. North of Inishee blocked by shallows and reed beds. Entrance to back river behind Muckinish and leading to auxillary sluices very badly silted with milled peat.

 Obstruction \(\frac{1}{4} \) mile; rise in river 6 feet all callows deeply flooded. Flow up to 5 Knots.
- 3. Immediately upstream of Banagher. Here a small island restricts the flow to a narrow shallow channel on the Galway side. Wide passage east of this island apprears blocked. There are additional shallows upstream of this island. Length of restriction 200 yards; Rise in

Lough Derg Rally II also ran its course despite one or two minor setbacks in the early part of the week, caused by gale force winds and torrential rain which forced the rally to stay an extra night in Scarriff and skip the trip to Killaloe. All the competitions were held, some in arduous conditions, except the sailing cruiser races, two of which were abandoned because of, would you believe it, lack of wind. An carly morning trip to Shannon Airport was arranged to Welcome home Pat Lawless following his successful single handed crossing of the Atlantic, well done Pat.

Following the torrential rain of Tuesday and Wednesday, the Scarriff river was in full flood, but commodore Joe Treacy and his committee took extreme safety measures to ensure that all boats got through his stretch of river safely, on their way to Dromineer on Thursday. The sun shone on Friday as the boats made their way to Kilgarvan. The sailing race was abandoned because there was no wind, so the sailors went to Rossmore for a picnic and tour up the Woodford River. Good to see John Weaving back at the helm, dredging the bar at the mouth of the Woodford river.

The sun shone again on Saturday, which encouraged a large entry and audience for the water sports which was organised by David Knight, and could only be described as hilarious, or chaotic, depending on your point of view, but it put all the rallyists in good spirits for the trip to Portumna for the closing dinner and prizegiving. Another good Derg Rally. Well done to Commodore Joe Treacy and his hard working committee.

The Premier Award was won by Mark Maguire on Maan of Derg.

My contention regarding these blockages can only be proved by the installation of depth guages just above and below each of these areas. At present the O.P.W. only takes river levels at certain points, however if the levels, taken on anyday of flood at Athlone, Banagher and Meelick Lock are related to O.S. datum, it will be found that, the fall in river level between Athlone and Banagher is approximately 1" per mile, while that between Banagher and Meelick is in the order of 2' per mile. A fair indication of where the major problem is situated.

With these downstream problems solved, some further points will be found to hold back water. Likely areas are:-

- Bend upstream of confluence of Brosna River. Removal of milled peat banks from Northern exit from canal and entrance to back river behind Bullock Island should cure any problem.
- 5. Derry . This cut may prove to be inadequately dredged.
- 6. Shannonbridge Abutments built during construction of Bord na Mona bridge seem to restrict flow and have greatly reduced maximum run at Shannonbridge itself. Shannon Bridge; shoals and the tail of Long island prevent flow through all arches except the Navigation arch.
- 7. One mile upatroum of Clemmachoine. Cut may prove inadequate.
- 8. Wren Island. Cut may prove inadequate.

It should be born in mind that without annual flooding, the fertility of the callow lands will be reduced. The annual top dressing of nutrients particularly those originating in Athlone will be missed.

Well done all concerned, keep up the good work.

Sieve all dry ingredients except brown flour and mix into brown flour. Add milk and stir, the mixture should be like porridge. Line the bottom of a loar tin with greaseproor paper and grease bottom and sides of tin. Place mixture in tin and cook for 45 minutes approx., in a fairly hot oven, 200 C or 425 F.

NORE NEWS

Kilkenny City, on the River Nore, is one of the cleanest and most attractive urban areas in Ireland. In fact, it won the National Tidy Towns Competition in 1985. Now the Kilkenny people have even more reason to be proud, for the major discharges of both municipal sewage and industrial effluent into the river have ceased, and all waste is being pumped to the huge treatment works at Purcellsinch, on the outskirts of the city. The River Nore is now cleaner than it has been for many years.

(Nore news continued)

From the 1930's sewage was treated in a septic tank at Maudlin Street, which has long been rendered obsolete by a rapidly increased population. All effluent has been ending up, untreated, in the river. By 1975, when Smithwick's Brewery, Fieldcrest Textiles, the Co. Council and the Corporation agreed a joint scheme for effluent treatment, things were reaching crisis proportions. 1979 saw the completion of the treatment works at Purcellsinch; and 1985 the provision of new pumping stations at Market Yard, Maudlin Street and Duke's Meadows. The end of this year should see a trunk sewer in the Pococke Valley to the west, should complete the scheme. Here indeed is a caring city of actively concerned people. River towns of Ireland, please take note!

In brief: Just heard that the breach in the weir at Lower Ballyellen on the Barrow has been fixed, and that the repaired lock gates should be back in position before the end of the month, so that the waterway will be open again for a bit of Autumn cruising before we all go home for the winter.



Guacamole, or how to feed 6 people with 2 Avocados

This is a specialty dish from Mexico and makes 2 Avocados go a long way.

1 level teaspoon sait

1 level tsp black pepper

1 level teaspoon made mustard

2 level tsp caster sugar

6 tablespoons lemon juice

2 ripe Avocados

2 tablespoons lemon juice

4 spring onions, finely chopped

3 tomatoes, skinned and chopped

Put salt, pepper, mustard and sugar into a small bowl and blend in the oil, and lemon juice.

Cut the Avocados in $\frac{1}{2}$, remove the stone and scoop out the flesh into another bowl.

Mash it with a fork until smooth.

Mix in the dressing at once as the Avocados will discolour if left, and add tomato and onion.

Serve on small plates with a leaf of lettus as a starter, or on its own as a dip.
